**Message from the manse**

September always feels like the start of a new year! As our youngsters start a new year in school some may even start a new school.....others may start college....others may start University! In some ways, it feels like the church is starting a new term too. As the groups that have had a break for the summer start again we, as the church, have new things to look forward to as well. We continue the prayer walks and we begin the new format of evening worship. We also have the Ian Newman Community Film Club starting on the 16th September.



For those that have been on holiday I hope you have had

a good and refreshing time. For those who have yet to go on holiday then I hope you have a great and refreshing time.

As everything starts up again this month I want to encourage us all to hold all we do in prayer. I see that there are huge challenges ahead - but not just any challenges but exciting, if not sometimes scary, challenges. As the wider synod and denomination grapple with the ever-decreasing number of ministers (due mainly to a large number of retirements) churches are being encouraged to think differently about ministry and mission. Our Synod have taken the decision to employ 3 full time mission advocates to work in three of the four Areas within our synod. Revd Darren Holland (previously a Methodist minister in a circuit in Oldham) has been designated to serve in our Area (Central Area of the North-Western Synod). Darren is a great guy and passionate about mission. I have had a meeting with him as one of the ministers serving in this Area and he has led a discussion at the Monday night homegroup too.

I hope to invite him to take part in a service and share with us the work he and his colleagues are doing in the Synod. Along with these 3 people Lawrence Moore (former Director of the Windermere Centre) has also been employed by the Synod on a part-time basis as a Mission Consultant (I forget his actual title now) he will work with the three Mission Advocates and be a support to them.

The Synod are investing in people to support local churches in discerning what their mission in their community is. When I say these are exciting times I mean because of what God will do in and through local churches.

What scares me is people (who are the church) not engaging and simply continuing down the same road and seeing further and further decline.



## **A Senior Moment**

On a mild and dry evening approximately 80 of us had a whale of a time. The occasion was to celebrate the return from Australia of one of our 9 grandchildren, Gregg Beaumont.

Gregg and a group of fellow students had just spent a year there as part of their degree course.

Incidentally included were other grandchildren, Lauren about to leave for a years post-grad experience in Oz (followed by an ever-growing stream of boyfriends) and Alasdair, her brother, who had just taken up his first post as a doctor in Kent.

All ages from 11 to we in our 80s were present and revelling in the BBQ, drinks, food, dancing, singing and silly games. Encouragingly Irene's 70 sausage rolls, lemon slices and cheese straws were amongst the first to vanish like magic. What was really heart-warming was the lovely behaviour of the young people.

The real magic moment for me and reason for this writing occurred when Gregg's younger brother and Jodie's twin Max dragged me from the small dance area and proceeded to dance around the garden carrying my 12½ stone weight with ease.

This was the young lad whose life was saved shortly after birth by a brave and sharp-eyed nurse who called back the doctor to "just have another look". This was the beginning of many traumatic events, floods of tears and near-death experiences for young Max.

Profound thanks to the highly skilled, experienced and dedicated staff at Alder Hey Children's Hospital, Liverpool are due. There have been successive heart operations, periods of intensive care and 3 successive pulmonary artery replacements during which Max has

*We have good news from Gasundwe.*

*The most exciting development is that the boat is now operational! If you remember from the last newsletter our friends at Bamford and Norden Chapel in Rochdale raised money so that the village could have their own transport. The people of the village formed a co-operative entitled 'Gasundwe Transport Kivu Lake Transport Co-operative' and arranged for the boat to be built by the lakeshore, an*



*engine was purchased and transported from Kampala in Uganda, life jackets, insurance, boat safety and registration are all complete. Soon the business of earning money through transportation can begin. Two of our trustees, Lynne and Darryl Gregory have already tested it out and have sent photographs. (Please do keep an eye on the website and the Facebook page as detailed below.) It also means that the villagers will have much improved access to the hospital, health posts, markets and other essential services*

*The progress of the Boat Project has been astounding and has once again proved to me the determination of Rwandans to lift themselves out of poverty and our role is to give them a fighting chance.*

*Finally, the plans for 'culture tourism' are taking shape slowly but we are keen to see it happen. I will be making my trustee visit between January and March 2018 and I would be very happy to escort you to the village for a few days and to help you to plan the rest of your visit to East Africa if you so wish! 

During the summer holidays Toddlers Group have been raising money for 'Grace's Place', a new Children's Hospice. They did this through donations from our church family and Toddler family sponsorship. The Forget Me Not Children's Hospice is due to begin caring for children and families in the Bury, Rochdale and Oldham areas very soon. Opening a children's hospice in Bury means there will be additional care for more children with life threatening conditions and their families and importantly be based close to home.

All the building needs now is a few finishing touches, and staff.

Incidentally not an appliance found in many French kitchens. Which I guess just goes to prove you can take the girl out of Rochdale but you can't take Rochdale out of the girl!

The African Gold is simply the nicest tea and I've tasted a lot. Everyone who tries it agrees. Such a lot of hard work is required to bring us the cup that cheers, the least we can do is try and ensure the workers get a fair deal!"

Our stocks from Christmas are sadly long gone so I am hoping to order 2kgs of tea this time. The summer holidays are very long!!! I'm hoping that Mum can

travel light.

Take care and thank you for having introduced Mum to this tea. Many a time when I've been sipping my tea I think of you all at Bamford Chapel. The God speaks to us in mysterious ways." **RACHAEL**

**E-mail to me** "Of course I remember you [in my e-mail I asked this question]. Isn't Internet a wonderful thing – except when I'm in direct competition with one of the children's devices that is. Suddenly we can just chat as if we are standing in the coffee area on a Sunday! We are eagerly anticipating the tea arriving. We are making do with some overpriced tea dust at the moment. I know that resources are scant at the best of times but I can't help thinking, if only people could try the tea they would realise just how good it is and available practically on their doorstep. ## HAPPY 80TH BIRTHDAY TO THE 999 SERVICE

Did you know that ... The 999 Emergency Service was introduced 80 years ago – on 30th June 1937 in the London area only. It was the first service of its kind in the world and a notice in the Evening News suggested that the public should use it only if “the man in the flat next to yours is murdering his wife or you have seen a heavily masked cat burglar peering round the stack pipe of the local bank building.” For less urgent matters such as a lorry coming to rest in their garden, people were advised to “just call up the local police.”

The first call resulted in the arrest of a would-be burglar but not all were so serious. Of 1336 calls made in the first week, 91 were prank calls. One of the more unexpected results of the 999 service was its effect on telephone switch-rooms where a raucous buzzer sounded when someone dialled 999. It was reported that “a few of the girls found the situation too much and had to be carried out.”

Despite that 999 was a big success but it wasn't until after World War Two that it reached most other parts of the UK. It became available to the entire country only when all the telephone exchanges were automated in 1976.

The idea for an emergency number came after operators couldn't be reached to alert the Fire Brigade to a fire that killed five women in London's Wimpole Street in 1935. The number 999 was chosen because it was easy to dial even in the dark, on old style phones. More than half of genuine 999 calls ask for Police assistance. The next most requested is the Ambulance Service followed by the Fire Brigade and, finally, the Coastguard.

# Why do Christians pray?

Jesus taught his followers to talk to God in the same way that He did – like a child speaks to an adoring father. When they pray, Christians sense that they are in the presence of God. They are seeking to come close to the maker and shaper of the world's destiny. Christians lay open to God their deepest hope, happiness and anxiety. And they open themselves to God directing and changing them.

Those who take prayer to heart do not see it simply as a series of requests that God will change the world in the way they personally want. Rather it is an active way of participating in the working out of God's plan for the world. Prayer can involve words, silence, reading, responding to art, or listening.

Christians look for answers to their prayers in a change to their own actions and attitudes, and are overjoyed when the result is something that they recognise to be a miraculous intervention by God.

But despite that, God undoubtedly registers and responds in some way to all kinds of prayer – even the desperate cry in an emergency of someone who has barely even thought about whether He exists.

A conversation with God of this kind takes many forms:

**Praising** This involves a human being putting himself or herself in a place of appropriate humility in front of the God who is utterly holy, loving and just.

**Thanking** This is a way of recognising that everything that gives value or joy to life is the gift of a Creator, not merely good fortune.

**Asking** Prayers of this kind can be personal (such as begging for healing for a sick relative) or immense in scale (such as longing for the end of a war).

**Seeking forgiveness** This involves confession of something wrong (either personal or as part of a worldwide injustice) and a recognition that God has mercy on those who regret what they have done and seek to change.

**Looking for guidance** Prayer frequently asks God for direction, or seeks understanding in the face of the mysteries involved in being alive.

## Communal heroism

Christopher Nolan, the writer and director of *Dunkirk* describes the true event on which it is based as ‘one of the greatest stories in human history’. Brilliantly bucking the trend of recent war films he does not resort to gore and special effects, as he provides an immersive experience that enables the viewer to empathise with the young soldiers in their apparently hopeless situation, trapped between the sea and the advancing German army.



By cleverly moving around the timeline, we experience the different perspectives on land, sea and air. Particularly powerful is the interplay between two characters on one of the small boats heading to Dunkirk. Cillian Murphy plays a shell-shocked soldier picked up from a torpedoed ship, on the outward journey, and desperate not to be taken back towards the beach. Previously having starring roles in Nolan films (*Inception*, *The Dark Knight*) here Murphy is credited only as ‘Shivering Soldier’, a nameless character representing the 338,000 beaten and demoralised men who were rescued. Also in the boat is the 17-year-old George (played by Barry Keoghan) who is the only character whose back-story is revealed, when he says he has never achieved anything but wants to do something valuable with his life. George’s only skills appear to be making tea and carrying life-jackets, thus providing a poignant representation of the many ordinary people who joined together to make the Dunkirk evacuation possible.




Nolan says: ‘as a group of people we can achieve so much more than we can individually’, an important message for all of us. At that crucial time in history, King George VI called the nation to pray. As we pray for our nation today, perhaps God will open our eyes to see how we can each use our limited skills and resources for the common good.


