

Message from the Manse

Missional Partnerships update.....



On Saturday 7th April Carole Greaves and Pamela Harrington represented Bamford Chapel and Norden URC at a special meeting called by Revd Nigel Adkinson and myself. The meeting was to draw together all thirteen churches from within the Missional Partnership that we are to be part of.

Nigel and I called the meeting so that the different churches could begin to get to know each other more. All thirteen churches were represented at the meeting by one or two people. The meeting was very positive. It would be fair to say that those present wished to move forward in a positive way acknowledging that there are still unanswered questions.

There is another meeting of the same group of people on Friday 11th May at Radcliffe URC. The meeting on the 11th will be a meeting where ideas will be shared as to how we might move forward and help and support each other in building and extending the kingdom of God in the churches in which we are all situated.

The launch date for Missional Partnerships across the Synod is Sunday 20th May (Pentecost Sunday). Missional Partnerships are not intended to be another level of government within the Synod but a structure or system whereby ideas, resources, and talents can be shared across the churches within the partnership.

The work in the communities in which each church is set is still to continue. Where there is ecumenical working (as there is here for us at Bamford Chapel and Norden URC) we are to continue that work not pull away from it.

The Partnership that we are a part of is one of three Partnerships

within the Central Area of the North Western Synod (and there are four areas within the Synod as a whole).

Please pray that we would all be open to the promptings of the Spirit and the new opportunities that we hope will arise as we seek to further God's Kingdom through the life, worship and witness of His Church.

Synod Manse Scheme update.....

I hope most of us are aware of the Synod Manse Scheme that is being discussed at present. In order for Missional Partnerships to work fully there needs to be more flexibility in the way ministers are housed. As we move forward with Missional Partnerships the way ministers are "called" to serve will change from how we understand it now. As current ministers move on, the ones replacing them will not be called to specific churches or pastorates but to a Partnership role serving more strategically across a greater number of churches. It may be that manses are not in the right geographical location for a minister coming into a Partnership within the Synod. For this to be less burdensome on churches the Synod are asking churches to put their manse into the Synod Manse Scheme. Synod is offering a financial incentive to the church of 35% of the capital value of the manse. This offer, however, is time limited. Churches with manses have to make that decision by the 31st September 2018.

David Watson, who represented Bamford Chapel and Norden URC at the March Synod, has helpfully drawn together the main strands of the Synod Manse Scheme policy in a 2-sided document available at the back of Church. Hopefully you will already have that document by the time you are reading this magazine. If



anyone wants to see the fuller document (which is more than 2 sides of A4) then please ask David or me and we will email it to you or photocopy it for you. If you have not seen the abridged document

please read it before the Church Meeting on the 13th May.

The Church Meeting on the 13th May will be discussing this so please do your best to attend that Church Meeting so that your voice can be heard.



If we decide to put our manse into the scheme this doesn't mean I, Ruth, and the children will be moving out! We will live here as long as we feel it is right to do so. Basically putting the manse into the scheme will mean we cease to own it,

but we will also cease to be responsible for paying for the repairs and upkeep of it.

This is a very short and basic update on the Synod Manse Scheme – please see the two-sided document prepared by David or the fuller Synod Manse Scheme document for more detailed information.

I apologise that this "message from the manse" is less reflective or spiritual than it usually is! I felt both these items needed to be mentioned in my article this month.

obtaining a van and willing volunteers to transport a great many boxes which, as the need arises, will have to be brought back to restock the shelves. Speaking of shelves prompts me to remind you of our collecting box at the front of church where we would appreciate donations of sugar, milk, coffee, noodles and jam which are currently running low.

1st May Philip, the Apostle with Common Sense

Is there someone in church whom you respect for their spirituality and common sense combined – someone you feel easy about approaching

to ask questions? That person's patron saint should be Philip.

Philip came from Bethsaida, and was a disciple of Jesus from early on. He knew how to lead others to Jesus – he brought Nathanael (or Bartholomew) to Him in a calm, kindly way. He knew how to do some financial forecasting: at the feeding of the 5,000 it was he who pointed out that without divine help, even 200 pennyworth of bread wasn't going to feed that crowd. He was the one whom the Greeks approached when they wanted to ask Jesus to show them the Father, but didn't quite have the nerve to approach Jesus directly. People had confidence in Philip's spirituality, common sense and kindliness. Such a person is a gift to any church! In art, the Apostle Philip has been



represented either with a cross, or with loaves of bread.

Congregation Members Become "Dementia Friends"

On the evening of the 4th April the Serving Community Group welcomed Ali Roberts, local support worker for the Alzheimer's Society and volunteer Dementia Friends Champion to help us to become Dementia Friends. This is the UK's biggest ever initiative to change the way people think, act and talk about dementia. Some of the group were already Dementia Friends and wanted to update knowledge and remind us how we can support people with dementia, and some came for the first time to develop their understanding of the disease. The session was interactive and although sobering at times, very reassuring that if we all work together we can create dementia friendly communities where we can help people to live well with dementia.

Ali promoted the five key messages:

- 1. Dementia is not a natural part of ageing
- 2. Dementia is caused by diseases of the brain
- 3. Dementia is not just about losing your memory it can affect thinking, communicating and doing everyday tasks
- 4. It's possible to live well with dementia
- 5. There's more to a person than the dementia

Ali also informed us about the Alzheimer's Society's Turning up the Volume Research Report, some of the findings are below:

- ♦ 1 in 14 people over 65 years old have dementia
- 850,000 people in the UK are living with dementia
- ◆ 44% of people in the UK with dementia do not feel part of the community
- ♦ 40% of people in the UK with dementia feel lonely
- ♦ By 2051 over 2 million people in the UK will be living with dementia

Ali finished the session by giving us all a Dementia Friends Badge and challenging us to think about what action(s) we will take in our

communities. Judging by the discussion afterwards I think there were many actions planned.

My own actions are as follows:

- ◆ To promote and encourage congregation members, through this article, to consider either renewing their Dementia Friends training or attend a session
- To wear my badge at work and in my own time and tell at least 5 people about the training
- To work with the others in the Serving Community Group to maintain our ministry in local residential care homes and consider other new ventures to serve our community

It is now 12 months since Robert and I emigrated to North Yorkshire and at Lesley's invitation here is a bit of a retrospective of my 20 years at chapel.

I have seen 5 ministers serve God and His people over these 2 decades; all very different save for their uniform commitment to the service of word and sacrament. I look back on the faithful preaching of God's word from the pulpit, a metaphorical one in recent years, and an example so strong to me that I followed in their footsteps and continue to do so as a lay preacher. The word of God is read and taught faithfully, the people both in church and in the community are cared for in spiritual and practical ways; Gods praises are sung with gusto! There is youth involvement, Junior church thrives (few churches today have any at all, sadly) luncheon club, prayer group, ladies fellowship, food for thought, all ongoing when I joined and still thriving often in new and dynamic ways. The eldership continues in the same format and chapel has never been without a secretary and treasurer, all of whom ensured that during vacancy, and I saw 4 periods without a Minister; God's word and faithful service continued unabated.



So what has changed? Well, as I write this I realise the answer is, quite a lot! The church is no longer Bamford chapel, following the closure first of Heywood and more recently Norden we are a bigger family

under the umbrella of Bamford Chapel & Norden URC. Church has evolved as all living organisms should; the organ music is now supplemented by piano and other instruments. New music, new hymn books; use of projector and screen; no pews!!! Lovely comfy chairs creating a flexible worship space. Exciting new service format supplementing the established hymn/prayer sandwich ensuring a greater appeal to new folk; miss the choir though. But so many opportunities for mid week prayer and Bible study with home groups and sharing groups, an amazing preaching team serving within and outside, most of whom have come on board in these last 20 years.

May the light of Christ continue to shine through your witness and may the church continue to grow, thrive and evolve.

20th May - Day of Pentecost - Whit Sunday

Pentecost took place on the well-established Jewish festival of Firstfruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was exactly 50 days after the Passover, the time of Jesus' crucifixion.

A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit - the day the Church was born.



Jesus had told His disciples that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for His disciples – but He knew they could not do the work themselves – they would need His help.

And so they waited in Jerusalem, praying together with his other followers, for many days. And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues – to the astonishment of those who heard them. The curse of Babel (Genesis 11: 1-9) was dramatically reversed that morning.

That morning the Holy Spirit came to indwell the disciples and followers of Jesus: and the Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent.



Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning: proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Of course, Pentecost was not the first time the Holy Spirit had acted in this world. All through the Old Testament there are accounts of how God's Spirit guided people and strengthened them. But now, because of Christ's death and resurrection, He could INDWELL them. From now on, every Christian could have the confidence that



Jesus was with them constantly, through the indwelling of his Holy Spirit.

Fathers Selling Daughters to Avoid Poverty



In Ethiopia, one girl in five is now married off before she reaches the age of 15. Two in five girls are married by the age of 18. Many are married before they are 13. Child-marriage is on the increase due to the on-going drought, where struggling farmers sell their daughters, often to wealthy men, as a way of getting some income.

So reports World Vision, which warns that because of this, thousands of girls are being forced to leave school in order to perform the duties of women: housework, fetching water, cooking and care of siblings. World Vision warns that the drought may drive as many as seven million Ethiopians to rely on relief assistance this year - at a cost of £640 million.

Forgiveness and restoration

It is clearly coincidental, but perhaps providential, that *Paddington 2* was released whilst the media has been driving the #MeToo hashtag. We continually read new salacious stories revealing people's hidden depths of wickedness, with an implicit expectation that we should now vilify and exclude them. Then, along came *Paddington 2*, with its heart-warming story of a little bear who looks for the hidden depths of goodness in vilified and excluded people, with the explicit expectation that they should be recognised as part of the society which we all share.



The film's storyline is simple, but beautifully developed. Paddington is working hard as an accident-prone window cleaner to earn enough money to buy a pop-up book from an antiques shop to give to his aunt for her birthday. However, the book contains a secret message about the location of hidden treasure, and the villainous Phoenix Buchanan (Hugh Grant) steals it away. Wrongly convicted of Buchanan's crime, Paddington is sent to prison, where he faces the violent Knuckles McGinty (Brendan Gleeson).

Many children's films operate at two levels: obvious visual slapstick for young viewers, and subtle verbal humour for adults. *Paddington 2* has a much more connected integrity, with an underlying message for young



and old. As much as many of us have been hurt, in different ways, by the wicked behaviour of other people, there is good in everyone. And, as much as evil within people's hearts must be recognised and repented, the goal must be forgiveness and restoration. Many films utilise a redemptive story-arc for key characters. *Paddington 2* applies this to everyone. And, thereby, has an important

400 years ago, on 23rd May 1618, that the Thirty Years' War (Central Europe, mainly present-day Germany) began. One of the longest and most destructive conflicts in European history. Millions of people were killed. Finally ended on 15th May 1648.

200 years ago, on 4th May 1818 that Britain and the Netherlands signed a treaty on the prevention of the slave trade.

150 years ago, on 26th May 1868 that the last public execution in England took place. Irish nationalist Michael Barrett was hanged at Newgate for his role in the Clerkenwell explosion in London in December 1867, in which 12 people were killed.

75 years ago, on 16th & 17th May 1943 that the Dambusters Raid took place. Britain's RAF launched Operation Chastise, deploying bouncing bombs to bypass anti-torpedo nets and breach dams, causing catastrophic flooding in Germany's Ruhr Valley.

70 years ago, on 14th May 1948 that Israel was declared an independent state as the British mandate in Palestine came to an end. (Several Arab states invaded Israel the following day.)

50 years ago, on 8th May 1968 that British gangsters the Kray twins were arrested for murder. They were convicted in 1969 and sentenced to life imprisonment.

20 years ago, on 23rd May 1998, that in a referendum, the people of Northern Ireland voted to accept the Good Friday Agreement. 75% were in favour of a Northern Ireland Assembly.

10 years ago, on 25th May 2008 that NASA's Phoenix robotic lander spacecraft landed on Mars. It searched for environments suitable for microbial life and studied the history of water on Mars.

Why Children Find Pencils Difficult



Here is an unexpected problem: children are struggling to use pencils these days, because the excessive use of touch-screen phones is damaging their dexterity.

Now paediatric doctors, handwriting experts and orthopaedic therapists are warning that although kids may swipe a screen, they no

longer have the hand strength and agility to learn to write correctly when they start school.

It seems that the traditional skills of writing, drawing, painting, and cutting-out boost fine motor skills and co-ordination.

But now 'children coming into school are being given a pencil but are increasingly not able to hold it, because they do not have the movement skills,' says a paediatrician from the NHS. 'They need to manipulate playdough,



hold scissors, scribble with pencils, and so develop muscles in their shoulder, elbow and wrists.'


