

Message from the Manse



Philip Yancy in his book "Prayer – does it make a difference" says this: "I have said that the simplest answer to the question "Why pray?" is "Because Jesus did."" It is true there are many accounts in scripture when we read about Jesus spending time in prayer. It might be a somewhat simplistic question and answer given by Philip Yancy but it is no less true.

Richard Foster writing in his book "Celebration of Discipline" says this: "To pray is to change. Prayer is the central avenue God uses to transform us."²

I have been thinking quite a lot about prayer recently. I have spent time praying for this church as we work with other churches to think about and explore the theme of "Missional Partnerships". I have also been praying for this church and the elders as we discern what God is saying about the direction of travel that He wants us to take.

What I think is important is that the mission of the church and the future of the church is something we are all a part of. For us to discern what direction we are meant to travel in it is vital that we spend time praying (speaking and listening). Recently the Elders have been thinking about what the priorities should be for the church as we move forward. The more I think and pray the more I believe it is right that as a church we spend some time praying together. I know the thought of 'prayer meetings' or 'prayer services' fills some people with dread and fear! BUT... I feel the need to challenge us as a church (and I include myself in this challenge!) to come together in prayer. One of the aspects of my sabbatical study of two years ago both in reading about church growth and also visiting churches that were growing - was prayer. I am not talking about a weekly prayer meeting, where in a lot of churches there are a handful of faithful people praying regularly together, I mean focused prayer on what God wants of His Church in any given place.

So with this in mind, before the Elders and I set on a course that we feel is right, I want to invite us all to meet together to pray for God's church here at Bamford Chapel and Norden URC. The work of the

church is for each of us and I believe it is right that we spend set time meeting together to pray for God to reveal His plan and purpose to us. I am a firm believer in prayer and I feel that we ought to spend some focused time in prayer.

I have set 5 days at the end of October and the start of November for us to meet together to pray. It is not my intention that people come to each of the 5 sessions – but if you can make more than one then great!

The dates and times of the special prayer gatherings are:

Tuesday 30 th October	1.30pm – 2.30pm
Wednesday 31 st October	10.30am – 11.30am
Thursday 1 st November	1.30pm – 2.30pm
Friday 2 nd November	7.30pm – 8.30pm

I am firm believer that God blesses people and churches when people gather together to pray. I am *not* suggesting that prayer on your own at home is less powerful or effective. But I do believe when we come together as the family of God to pray for God's church – God is blessed, and we must believe God will speak to us and help us know what the next steps for mission are.



So I *plead* with you all to come along to one or as many of the prayer times as you can possibly make, so that we can pray together for God to reveal His plan and purpose to us as a church.

To coin a phrase from a recent Prime Minister – "we are all in this together." When it comes to the work of mission and praying for God's will to be done, we are indeed all in this together.



Grow an Attitude of Gratitude

Harvest is a time of thanksgiving to God for all His provision for us. It is good to cultivate a grateful heart, and studies have shown that people who practise thankfulness tend to have a more positive outlook on life, be more optimistic about the future, and are generally healthier than those who do a lot of grumbling and complaining.



It occurs to me that most of us make a loud noise when we are in need of help, but we are much quieter about giving thanks. We are not inhibited when making our needs known to God, but how many of us make a point of giving Him thanks when we have received His help? Do we sing His praises loudly? Do we give clear testimony to what the Lord has done?

Why not try and cultivate the discipline of gratitude in your life? Make it a rule to thank anyone who helps you in some way, or who encourages you. Let them know you appreciate them. Review each day before you sleep, reminding yourself of every good thing that happened and offering your thoughts to God as a prayer. Introduce a short time of giving thanks in your church service. In your home group have a time of praying short, sentence prayers of gratitude to God. Keep a gratitude diary.

Rather than focus on what you don't have, or what has gone wrong,

We Remember Thomas 'Derrick' Yates who passed away on 10th August Aged 91 years

Derrick, along with Joyce, attended our church for many years until frailty prevented them from coming. Derrick's contribution to church life was as a member of our 'Monday Gang', the group that meets each Monday to do small odd jobs and bigger jobs around our church.



Derrick along with Philip Mackimm had an engineering background and between them they could always find a solution to any job that cropped up. They inevitably each had their own preferred method of doing the job so the less talented members of the group tried whenever possible to give them separate jobs to do, which prevented any ensuing discussion from taking up most of the morning.

Meeting Derrick at Monday Gang and benefiting from his talents there did not tell half the story of this remarkable man. It was on the occasions of visits to see him and Joyce that the other parts of his life came to light. His incredible memory of bygone days and his ability to tell a story made these visits unforgettable. He told of his young days in Wigan, of local characters and anecdotes as he relived those times in the telling.

Derrick wrote short stories, poems and reminiscences, some that he left in a folder for Joyce to read. Some of these pieces he submitted to local magazines for publication. He composed music and the piece that

was played by Geoff on the occasion of his funeral was one that Derrick had composed himself.

Derrick's life in Wigan involved the local wrestling club and amateur dramatics among other things. Derrick had a wonderful way with words bringing to life tales of goings on at these and of other occasions. He was also a great listener and would give great attention to those who visited him and Joyce.

His care and concern for Joyce over the almost twenty years of their marriage was evident in all that he did for her.

He will be lovingly remembered and greatly missed by those who knew him.

During the summer, I have been working on the programme for the coming season. Details are in last month's magazine and are also available in leaflet form to be handed to friends who may be interested.

It has been our policy over many years to engage the best artistes available. Last season, dreadful weather on one Tuesday meant that performers who had travelled some way to us were greeted by a very small audience. The pavements were impossible for pedestrians that day! The young artistes quite understood, and gave immense pleasure to those who made it to the Chapel, though the caterers had many filled rolls to spare!

Our committee has decided not to raise the price of admission so as to encourage as many as possible to attend. At the same time, we have had to increase the payments to our artistes, not by as much as we would like but at least to keep them willing to come. It is only the diligent and faithful work of our catering teams that enables us each year to make a substantial contribution to Gift Day. Visitors can still have a substantial buffet lunch and a first-class concert for under ten pounds, though of course we welcome those who choose just to come for the concert at £4.

We have just six concerts each year, and I again invite you to join us. Some of our artistes can command much higher fees than we pay them at events across the country, including at the Wigmore Hall and the Bridgewater Hall. They come because they enjoy playing to audiences in smaller, more intimate venues like ours, and even ask to be invited back. So please do support us. It is very rewarding to us when you

come in good numbers, and I can assure you the music you hear will be of excellent quality. Moreover, we try to cater for a similar number each month, so regular attendance helps our catering teams immensely and avoids either surplus food or an occasional embarrassing shortfall!

Psalm 121 - the God who Knows and Cares

A man asked a friend about the two greatest problems in the world. The friend responded, 'I don't know and I don't care!' 'You got them both!' the man replied.

Psalm 121 presents a God who both knows and cares about our problems. As the first Song of Ascent (Psalms 120-134), it was used by pilgrims going to the great festivals in Jerusalem. Just as this road was full of dangers, this psalm speaks to our problems and set-backs, whether illness, family or work issues, or fear.

Where do we look for help? 'I lift up my eyes to the mountains... My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth.' (1,2). The hills speak of a Creator God, who is bigger than our troubles, for whom nothing is beyond His reach.

What is His care like?

It is constant: 'He will not let your foot slip - He who watches over you will not slumber' (3). God is never off duty in His care, as we are constantly His concern.

It is close: 'The Lord watches over you - the Lord is your shade at your right hand' (5).

God is not watching us 'from a distance' as the songs says! His care operates at close quarters, to take the heat out of situations, or when circumstances are dark and uncertain.

It is continuing: 'the Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and for evermore.' (8). God's care is all encompassing, through life and eternity. We are not immune from difficulties, but in the bigger picture, God will use these in His eternal purpose for our lives. The psalm is fulfilled in Jesus, who has secured eternal life for us.

So let's trust His care for us, and not be like the lady who asked: 'why pray when I can worry?'

DRUMBEAT CHILDREN'S FOUNDATION FARM PROJECT: CHURCH PROJECT 2018

The project was launched on Sunday 9th September during morning worship. Our local contact Peter Williams and his wife Linda, fresh from Uganda, provided us with further information about the overall organisation and gave us a taste of what the money gathered by this church will be used for.

The project launch was followed by a lunch which kick started our funding by raising over £170. Each week the total will be announced in family time with the help of another of Addie's famous totalizers!! The Drumbeat Children's Foundation seeks funding to purchase two acres of land to be used for farming purposes, involving growing of crops and rearing of livestock.

Although most of the population in Uganda is dependent on subsistence farming, many deprived households do not have access to land to grow enough food for their families. 90% of the children Drumbeat Children's Foundation support come from households that are faced with the problem of inadequate land for farming activities. The organisation will not be able to fund this development without our help and support.

Specific items we can support/deliver with the money we raise and costs?

- Acquisition of land
- ♦ Land surveying to establish boundaries
- ◆ Land preparation and clearing
- Seeds and seedlings
- ◆ Labour (Planting, weeding, pruning etc.)
- ◆ Farming implements and equipment



Totals: 25,800,000 UGX equivalent to £5,160 (£1 is equivalent to 5,000 shillings)

Objectives of the Farming Project

Once implemented, the project will aim to achieve the following objectives:

- To produce food crops, vegetables and fruits so as to attain food security and better nutrition for the deprived children and households that are being supported.
- To raise livestock (pigs & goats) for generating income to support the organisation's charitable purposes.



- To produce quality seeds and seedlings that can be distributed to deprived households and communities during the planting season.
- To engage and increase participation of deprived communities in the agricultural sector with the aim of reducing poverty thus improving their livelihoods.

Sustainability

- This project when fully implemented will also serve as a model/ pilot project, which can be replicated in other areas.
- Once the crops are ready for harvest, some of them will be supplied to those deprived households that do not have enough land or the capacity to grow their own food and where there is any surplus, it will be sold and the funds generated will be used to support the organisation's activities.
