

### **Message from the Manse**



As part of my opening devotions at the Elders' Meeting in January I asked the elders what their hopes were for the year, but more widely, for their two-year term of office. One of the points made was about seeking people's gifts and utilising them. As I write this article, I have been looking at the Lectionary Readings for the coming Sunday. One of the readings is from 1 Corinthians

12 (verse 1-12). We read in those verses about Paul teaching the Corinthian believers about spiritual gifts.

#### After listing the gifts, Paul writes:

"All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines." (1 Corinthians 12:12)
Paul doesn't say, "to the select few" he says, "to each one".

Sometime this year we will probably be commissioning the Missional Partnerships within the North Western Synod of the URC. It will be a defining moment in the life of the Synod as it will feel distinctly different. What is important is that the work of the church continues and that the proclamation of the gospel, which is a task for us all, continues. To do that it means that we each need to use the gifts the Lord Jesus has given us.

In this process we need to pray that God will show us what **His** priorities are, not ours. And that we move forward as one body, the body of Christ, here in this place, but also within the Missional Partnership as well.

We need to pray that God will draw people into our churches. But that doesn't mean that we simply sit back and wait for people to come in. We need to actively reach out and share the good news we profess. We need to share our story. Our stories are unique. Whether we have come to faith slowly and gradually over many months or



years, or whether we have had a Damascus Road type of encounter with Jesus, our story is not less or more powerful than the person who we sit next to in church.

We need to be confident in sharing our faith story. We need to rely on the power of the Holy Spirit and pray that the Holy Spirit will lead us, equip us and give us the words to say.

Let us commit to praying the words Jesus taught his disciples, then and now, "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done." (Jesus).

## Lent 2019 - Help needed



## **General Data Protection Regulation Update**

Thank you to all those who have filled in the consent forms. I have now begun to transfer all the details on to a spreadsheet which will then be encrypted and kept on Ann Fitton's church laptop. So far we have had about a 65% return but new elders are still chasing the unreturned sheets — most of these are from people who do not attend church regularly.



The suggestion is that the elders review this list once every 12 months in order to add or take away anyone who has left or who has requested to be removed.

In order to keep it updated, the suggestion is that a consent form is given out at the same time as the card which is given to new people, once they have been coming for some weeks. Their details can then be added to the spreadsheet by Anne Fitton.



All future documents which require people to fill in details will include a paragraph which references the church GDPR procedures – this includes forms for groups such as Luncheon Club and Toddlers. We keep all data for legitimate purposes and comply with

the General Data Protection Regulations.

At a previous church meeting I was asked whether we were allowed to include children's names on the church directory if parents hadn't been asked for consent. Following consultation with my GDPR officer through work, we have been reassured that as we are processing the data through 'legitimate interests', we do not need further consent, but parents may object if they wish. Please let me or Richard know if you wish your children's name to be kept out of the church directory.

# Remembering Hilda Howard



It was with great sadness that we heard of the death of Hilda Howard early in the New Year. Her funeral which was well attended was held on 20<sup>th</sup> January and was conducted jointly by our minister Richard and Margaret Ogden.

Hilda had been an active member of our church since 1984 following the death of her husband Jack. The minister then was Ivor Rees and, having conducted Jack's funeral, he suggested to Shirley Sharp that she visit Hilda and so began a friendship that would last until Hilda died.

Gradually she became more and more involved with the weekly activities here and gathered an ever-increasing circle of friends, all of them widows like herself... Shirley, Beryl Read, Audrey Telford, Mildred Ingham, Margaret Entwistle and later Jean Fitton, to name but some. Every week this group would meet on a Sunday evening to play cards. They would go out for lunch most Sundays and she and Shirley used to do a lot of walking together.

Hilda attended services week by week, became a member of the Ladies Guild and after a while, took on the responsibility of booking speakers for their meetings. Then, when the Guild started to meet at the home of Rose Birtwell on Bagslate Moor Rd, she took it upon herself to act as chauffeur for the other 9 ladies involved, bringing them to the meetings and then taking them all back home again.

She was a driver for the Luncheon Club, long before she thought herself old enough to sit down and be waited on, and she attended a Bible Study group, anxious to develop her knowledge and faith.

Sadly, some years ago her eyesight began to deteriorate as Macular Degeneration was diagnosed. She could no longer enjoy her hobbies... gardening, reading, knitting, bowls or even playing her favourite game of Rummikub but, worse still, driving became impossible. She had driven for 57 years but now her independence was gone and she had to depend more and more on friends and family.

Because of her failing eyesight, falling became a problem

and one fall resulted in a broken hip, which meant she had to be admitted to Tudor Court to recuperate. She celebrated her 90th birthday whilst there. Her niece Liz, backed up by her friends, persuaded her that living alone in Unsworth Court was no longer an option and so in 2017



she moved into the Millfield Care Home where she remained until she died.

Hilda was a highly respected, pleasant and generous lady, who was always appreciative of the things that were done for her. She will be sadly missed by all who knew and loved her.



#### **Drumbeat Children's Foundation**

Drumbeat goes from strength to strength with more people coming on board to sponsor vulnerable children's education and to date we have 78 children who are in school and receiving the education that they deserve but couldn't afford.

# The Agricultural Project

John has found a suitable plot of land in Kyalusowe village which is not far from grannies house and close to the school that we used for the summer camp. As you can see it is not much to look at, at the moment, but it is ideal for the project that John wants to set up. Just to remind you — the land would be used to keep livestock like chickens and goats and to grow crops. It will be tended by the families of our children and will be a source of food when needed. I'm sure you remember that we have said that eating each day for many of our children is not guaranteed and often depends on what

the children and their guardians can earn each day to buy food. This project will provide stability for many of our families.

So, to everyone at Bamford Chapel the biggest **thank you** for all you have done to make this project a reality in Kyalusowe village.

## Valentine's Day

## **Midday Concerts 2019**

Following the Christmas/New Year break, and in the depth of winter, we are always a little apprehensive about the January audience size. This year we were very pleased to welcome 50 patrons for what was another exceptionally good concert by two first-class artistes. Anna Rosa Mari brought with her two flutes, one the usual concert-sized version and the other an alto flute which she played for just one piece, where its warm tone was particularly appropriate. Her colleague was Eira Lynn Jones, a superb harpist who, as well as performing on stage is Head of Harp at the RNCM.



The harp was itself a thing of real beauty and craftsmanship, and is currently valued at £68000. We were told that insurance alone for this magnificent instrument is £10 per day!

Anna and Eira had prepared an excellent and varied programme, featuring music by, among others, Mozart, Debussy, Schubert and Vaughan Williams, whose "Greensleeves" sounded truly captivating on harp and flute. Eira took time to

demonstrate the structure of the harp and at the end of the recital invited members of the audience to take a guided tour! Two or three men ventured to pluck strings for themselves and were manifestly impressed.

Our next concert is on 12<sup>th</sup> February and features the Tee Trio, named after its pianist. The trio comprises Clarissa Lim (violin), Laura Jane Armstrong (cello) and Weng Soon Tee (piano). Laura approached us because she had read about our concerts on the Chapel web page. The CV of the group impressed me, and these young professional musicians are coming from London to be with us – we are paying them a little more than usual to help with their travel costs, but despite the distance they are really keen to come. Once again I invite our readers to support us: we do not settle for anything but the best talent available. In our turn, we want to put those who

come to entertain us in front of a substantial audience. We have been fortunate in gathering new supporters from the wider area, but we still like to think of these concerts as an essential part of our lives here at Bamford Chapel and Norden URC.

At our concluding concert of the season on 12<sup>th</sup> March, we will once again welcome young musicians of great talent and promise from Chetham's School of Music.

# **Desert Island Discs at Ladies Fellowship**

What a delightful evening as Walter Brisk shared his life of music with us! A dismal January evening was transformed into a balmy exotic day in the tropics, by the sound of the intro song 'Sleepy Lagoon). Thanks to our Rev Richard for downloading it.



Walter's musical choices reflected his life experience, beginning with his introduction to live classical music through **Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 4. In 1943.** 

This new-found delight was nurtured with the opportunity as a schoolboy to attend an evening concert where the Liverpool Philharmonic performed the **Grieg Piano Concert**.

As his teaching career began in Liverpool, he formed his first choir at **Olive Mount Secondary School.** Thanks to modern technology (and Brian Scott) the original recording of this choir had become a CD and we were able to hear Walter's Choral Director Debut.

Walter's love, respect and admiration for his students was clear each time he recalled introducing them to new musical experiences or challenging performances; the school in Thatcham and Benjamin Britten's Ceremony of Carols; the trip to the ballet in Bristol (La Fille mal Gardee) and the reaction of 'cool' teenage boys, (who'd only gone because of the girls) to the experience "When can we go again, sir?"

His other love (organ music) amazingly links St Paul's Cathedral with Bamford Chapel! At St Paul's he heard a piece called **Sortie by Lefebure Wely** and that very same piece was later played by **Ronald** 

**Frost** when the new organ at Bamford Chapel was consecrated.

Walter conducted the Saddleworth Male Voice Choir for 25 years and his memory track was "And the Glory, the Glory of the Lord" from The Messiah, when SMVC was joined each year by ladies from the area.

Another link with fame was his relationship with Howard Goodall, who had written early in his career, some pieces for the SMVC. They were very difficult and some had inappropriate words. In conversation, Howard apologised!! However the memory track was Howard's well known setting of **Psalm 23 for the Vicar of Dibley.** 

We heard Russian voices singing **Red Army Favourites** and Trinity College, Cambridge performing 'Allegri's Miserere'.

His final choice reminded him of the Midday Concerts which he has been involved in organising from 1992 to the present day. It was a track from 'Mist of the Mountains' played by the A4 BRASS QUARTET.

Finally our very own Sue Lawley or Kirsty Young (aka Lesley Sutton) asked the inevitable famous questions;

Q. What book would you take?

A. Alan Bennett's "Keeping on, keeping on"

Q. If only one record – which one? A. Allegri's Miserere

Many thanks to Walter (ever the perfectionist) for the hours of preparation time he had spent to share such a fascinating 'life of music' journey. And grateful thanks, I'm sure, from all who have enjoyed singing with him and learning so much from him over the years.

Pat Anderson gave the vote of thanks and shared that she had been 'one of the ladies of the area' who augmented the SMVC in the Christmas performances of 'The Messiah'.

### Shine, Jesus, Shine

At the flick of a switch or a press of a button we can illuminate our homes with all kinds of gadgets. City life has street lights everywhere and if we need a light for dark places we can use a torch.

Life for people in Bible days must have been so different. The darkness was something to be feared. Anyone in the open at night was vulnerable to attack, not only by robbers and thieves but also by animals.

The Bible often mentions darkness to be a symbol for evil, whether real or imaginary. The Old Testament records watchmen on the walls of a city or large town who were employed to protect the inhabitants. Watchmen were impatient for the sunrise and a psalmist thinks of his soul waiting on God to deliver him, like the watchman waiting for the dawn. (Psalm 130:6)

The Bible often associates darkness for inappropriate behaviour, problems, difficulties, wrong-doing and malevolence. Darkness can also mean a wrong course of action, wilfulness and stupidity. When the Scriptures speak of *light* this shows up what is amiss with our lives. Light can reveal a problem and show the way to avoid or overcome it.

The prophet Isaiah wrote about people walking in darkness and seeing a great light. This in turn would change their lives for the better. He was describing the coming of Jesus who would be a light for us. He would come to reveal everything that is wrong with us, and to be the means to bring us a new life, a new purpose and a new future. He would break the power of sin and death and make it possible for everyone to be reconciled to God.

In a world that needs to see the healing and saving light of Jesus, we are called to be lights of hope, peace and love. What we do and what we say matters. Our actions and words should point people to our heavenly Father. Sometimes this is difficult and sometimes we fail. But we still should try to be like the psalmist who, while thinking about God, said



Your word is a lamp to guide me and a light for my path. (Psalm 119:105)

Too many of you to mention by name, but we have been so uplifted & comforted knowing that we were being cared for by you all.




