Message from the Manse

As I write this article (5th January) it seems like Christmas is only just over and as I glance across the document I am putting together for Linda I see the start of Lent on the 18th February! Both Advent and Christmas, Lent and Easter are times that I really enjoy. Notwithstanding the busyness of such periods it is important that we take the time to reflect on the birth, life, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ. And these festivals/seasons/ times of the year remind us of just how much God gave to us when He gave His one and only Son Jesus Christ. Jesus came that we might have life and have it to the full.



There are going to be changes afoot locally and nationally with regards ministry and how churches will be served by ministers in the years to come. Much has been said about "Missional Discipleship" and "Missional Partnerships" within the Synod and when we

look at the URC nationally there is discussion on the initiative of "Walking the Way – Living the life of Jesus today."

Both the Synod and the national initiatives have Discipleship at their core. Discipleship is something that excites me. It is a journey of walking with Jesus as through the power of the Holy Spirit we are made more and more like him. I am heartened, excited and challenged by the way we are being encouraged to think about church life differently. As I speak to people in Church about this I have heard all manner of opinions - sceptical, excited, hopeful, worried, scared, confused to name just some emotions.

On each Sunday morning in January and finishing on the 4th February I have been preaching on Discipleship using Philippians as the main text for my sermons. Each of the 5 Sundays copies of each of the five parts of Lawrence Moore's "Missional Discipleship" booklet have been made available to you. I hope you have read and/or will read that booklet. If you have missed any paper copies there should be copies in Church. If there aren't please ask me to photocopy you one or I can email it to you. If you have missed any of the sermons and wish to listen to them

then we have that facility on the Church website — www.bcnchurch.org.uk and click on the "audio" tab on the main page of the site. Technology dependent all of the 5 sermons will be on the website now or as soon after the Sunday as possible (paper copies can be made available if you prefer – please just ask me.)

As we move forward as a church into 2018 I want to encourage us all to be open to the promoting and leading of the Holy Spirit. Please pray for the Elders this year as we discuss what we feel, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, are the priorities for us as a church. Please do your utmost to attend Church meetings as new initiatives and changes to current initiatives may well be brought to your attention.

The dates of Elders' Meetings and Church Meetings are listed in this edition of the Church magazine.

Let us commit to journeying together on the path of faith and discipleship.

It's that time of the year again when Rochdale's Christian Aid Committee organises a big event. This year it is to be held at St John's and if you have never been inside



Ladies Fellowship January Meeting

At our January meeting we were given a talk by Richard Whittle on the history of Healey Dell. Richard led us around a 3 mile walk with photos both from the past and the present. We were shown the changes that had been made to ensure everyone was safe and the kissing gate made to accommodate the disabled with their motor scooters. The trees planted along the walkways and the changes made to allow for all the rain we get and hopefully not destroy any more of the history through flooding.

We were taken through the history of Healey Dell from its beginning in 1867 and were told about the remains of the mills dotted around the dell. There was Broadley Wood Mill which was a cotton mill. Stone Rubbing Mill was built in 1880. This mill smoothed off the flagstones

ready for paved areas, including Trafalgar Square in London. The Pulling Mill was built in 1676 and was used to eliminate pollutants from wool by people stamping on the wool. This mill was known as 'Th' Owd Mill I'th Thrutch' or in today's English 'Old Mill in the Valley'.



We were told about Healey Dell Viaduct which has 8 arches but only 7 can be seen as the other is hidden by the trees. One section of the wood is ancient woodland and has been there for over 400 years. The new woodland is on the east side and was

started with planting in the 1970's. There are many initiatives to help the wildlife. These include using chopped down trees to form hedges, which also helps to keep the wood tidy. Cutting down some of the saplings helps open up the sky and allows the bats to fly through. There are also plans for a wildflower meadow to be planted.

The evening was very interesting and informative and if anyone has not been, then it is well worth a visit. Richard informed us that there are some guided walks planned, one in May, so keep an eye out for these to be advertised.

Our next meeting is on **Thursday 8th February** with a talk about Memorabilia. This is a change to the programme and we hope you will join us for some nostalgia.

The Choir

It was with great regret on Tuesday 16th January that the members of the Choir decided that they could no longer continue to serve in this capacity following the announcement that Geoff Ogden, our organist, had decided that he is no longer safe climbing onto and sitting on the organ

stool and has tendered his resignation to Richard. Geoff has, apart from holidays, played for our Tuesday rehearsals for the last 41 years and for many of us it has been an important part of our lives which we will really miss. We have asked around to see if someone could step in and fill the gap but so far we have no one who could commit themselves on a regular basis.

Our choir has had an excellent reputation over many years, reaching its Heyday under the direction of Walter Brisk when we were over forty in number and formed the nucleus of what became known as the United Christian Singers in their first ever performance held at the Free Trade Hall in Manchester when we sang Roger Jones' "Mary Magdalene".

Walter was a hard act to follow and I took on the leadership role in fear and trepidation in January 1996, having stood in over the previous few years when Walter was unavailable. I never claimed to be a choirmaster but together we muddled through and, I hope, have made a worthy contribution to worship over the last 21 years. I would like to pay a personal tribute to the members of the choir who have so loyally turned up to rehearse week by week. We have had lots of fun in the process and it really has been a privilege to share such happy times, and sad ones too, with them all. Sadly the years have taken their toll as we have said goodbye to loyal members like Olive Brierley, Margaret Entwistle, John Telford and Derek Gooding who have gone on to sing in God's choir: others like Audrey Telford and Diane Healey who found their singing days were at an end and yet others who could no longer commit the time or have moved away from the area.

Our last contribution was at the Carol Service when we were down to just sixteen. However, numbers are not everything and lots of people commented on how well the choir had sung. (In reality many churches

would give anything to have a congregation of sixteen never mind a choir!) So at least we finish on a high and pray that God will use whatever talents we have in other ways in the future.

Geoff Ogden

On Sunday 14th January after the evening service, Geoff reluctantly made the decision that he had played the organ for the last time. (For some time he had felt very unsafe on the organ stool and those of us who were at a service last year when he actually lost his balance and fell backwards off that very stool, will be able to sympathise with those feelings.) It was not an easy decision to reach after being a church organist for 76 years. I posted the news on Facebook and he has been overwhelmed by the comments made on that social media network.

Geoff fell in love with the organ at a very young age. He had started piano lessons at the age of seven in 1936 and had a few organ lessons on the organ at York St Congregational Church where his family were regular worshippers. At the age of twelve he became the assistant organist and played each week for the morning



services. He also played for his first wedding in Bury at the age of twelve. He took over as the York St organist, which meant playing for the evening services, at the age of fourteen and continued in that role until the York St church was pulled down because of dry rot in 1970.

The congregation then moved to Captain Fold which had been an off shoot Sunday School and that is where the Church remained through the changeover to the URC, with Geoff playing for both services. In 1976 the minister at Bamford Chapel, Jeff Yates, asked Geoff if he would consider becoming the organist at Bamford. He agreed and played for both morning and evening services while continuing to play for the afternoon services at Heywood. He thus played for three services every Sunday until Heywood closed in 2003 and since then has continued playing for two services at Bamford Chapel (assisted by Lifeline) until Richard became our minister and invited others to form a

rota. Throughout the years he has played for about 8000 services in addition to hundreds of weddings, funerals and choir practices.... an amazing commitment by anyone's standard.

He will certainly be missed by those traditionalists among us who still enjoy singing with the organ and we say thank you for all those hours of dedication. We will particularly miss the sensitive way he picked up on the theme of the children's address or sermon and played pieces to reflect that as the children left or at the end of the service, causing many of us to smile. There will never be another one like you Geoff and we wish you well in your 'retirement'.

Midday Concerts

In December we played hosts to a superb wind quintet. Unfortunately, an earlier snowfall followed by a severe frost had made the pavements and the Chapel car park very hazardous, and to our dismay only 24 people turned up to see and hear this delightful group of highly accomplished musicians,



who reached us safely because the roadways were actually safe for driving. The young people in the quintet were very understanding: though we always negotiate a fee months ahead, their payment was secure but one senses that a very small audience must be a bit of a disappointment to artistes of this quality. They did not complain and said that they completely understood the situation.

We hoped that the January audience might see us back to the 50s and 60s in numbers, but for no weather reason we could see, we still managed only the mid-30s. This month the soloist was Edward Robinson (baritone) together with his accompanist Dennis Tjiok. Their programme was entirely based on varying styles in folk song. We heard songs, many of them unfamiliar, from a number of eminent British composers, but were quite bowled over by a couple of compositions by Dennis, our accompanist, who surprised us by playing on the keyboard and by plucking the piano strings from above — at virtually the same time! Though our audience was relatively few, many stayed behind to compliment the two visitors on the range and quality of their music.

We sincerely hope our audience will be substantial on 13th February, when a partnership called the Meraki Duo (flute and guitar) will be our guests. Like all our other artistes this season, these two come very highly commended. It would be good to see more present than in December and January, partly to show encouragement for young musicians at the very beginning of their professional careers, and also to help consume the splendid refreshments prepared by our most loyal catering ladies. It is exceedingly hard for them to determine in advance how many will come for lunch! Do consider coming – and bring a friend or two as well! We can promise you fine music. And in March, to close our season, we will welcome string players from Chetham's School of Music, and once more we can be assured of uplifting entertainment from young musicians.

Editor: The Rev Paul Hardingham considers this month's unlikely link of Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day ...

'Lenten Valentines'

During this month Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day, share the same date! It seems an odd mix, yet there is an obvious link: love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, is about learning how to love



God more, as we give Him space in our lives. It's also an opportunity to reflect on Jesus' experience in the wilderness (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was led into the desert by the Spirit (1), where He was tempted by Satan, but demonstrated the path of

real love. Jesus is tempted to turn stones into bread. Love gets to the heart of human need, not just satisfying physical desires. Satan tempts Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is the beginning of love and results in sacrificial service to meet the needs of others. Finally, He is tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Only real love can change hearts by practical love and care.

Lent teaches us how to live out the love of God in practice, as we follow Jesus in the way of the cross.

Valentine was Christ's follower, committed to sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3rd Century AD and was martyred on February 14th. Emperor Claudius felt that soldiers in the Roman Army were distracted from their duty by their wives, and so attempted to outlaw marriage. It is believed that Valentine married couples in secret. He also helped Christians in Rome during times of persecution. He demonstrated the importance of showing real love in action.



In trying to understand the meaning of her revelations from God, Julian of Norwich found: 'What, do you wish to know your Lord's meaning in this thing? Know it well, love was his meaning.'

During Fairtrade Fortnight (27 Feb – 11 Mar) stand with hidden entrepreneurs like Ruth, Marcial and Justine who are transforming


their communities through Fairtrade. Help to close the door on exploitation and welcome more people in to Fairtrade.


