### **Message from the Manse**



At the start of his letter to the Philippians Paul says this: "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now." (Philippians 1:3 - 5)

Two things strike me about these two verses:-

#### 1. The word "Partnership"

Not just partnership with Paul but with each other. Perhaps more importantly the partnership we have with Christ in serving him and the community. The work of being a Christian and a Christian community (church) cannot be done in isolation. Being part of a fellowship of believers is so important.

For me the future of the church needs to be done in partnership together. As a Synod, as we know, we are exploring "Missional Partnerships" with other brothers and sisters in Christ in other churches. The idea being that "Mission" is the focus of our working; that together we can share resources and build each other up as we seek to be God's people and share the good news of the Gospel.

#### 2. The phrase: "from the first day until now"

Is the second thing that strikes me from these two verses. The Philippians first heard of the gospel in Paul's second missionary journey some ten years earlier. So Paul is thanking God for the partnership he has had with these believers for approximately ten years. This suggests to me that the work of the church is not done overnight. It is a continuing journey of discovery and partnership with Jesus and with our sisters and brothers in Christ. Likewise as the church today, both as individual congregations and as a Missional Partnership, we need to be committed to the work God has called us to do. It means sacrifice and it means offering ourselves afresh each time we meet together to be the people God has called us to be.

#### 3. The word "prayer"

One of the most important words (prayer). In my view our work has to be underpinned with prayer. And what saddens me in Church is how few people attend prayer meetings of whatever format. This is not unique to any one church. It seems to be a challenge in many churches, not just URC ones. I don't think it is any accident that at the very start of Paul's letter he uses the word prayer.



And prayer is vital in the church today as well. I know people pray in the quietness of their homes. But some of the most powerful meetings I have been to have been prayer meetings, when faithful believers have come together to seek God's direction. We are at a time in the life of the church, local and national, that we need to set time aside to allow God to speak to us and transform us.

I plead with you to join with me in praying for our church and whenever possible gathering together as a family to pray for our church and for all churches.



### **Pulpit Supply Secretary**



### Rev. Dr. C. M Kao 高俊明 (1929-2019)

Presbyterian Church of Taiwan

"The United Reformed Church (URC) is sad to report the death of the Revd Dr C M (Chun-Ming) Kao who passed away on 14 February.

Dr Kao was the General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan (PCT) and a staunch advocate of human rights and democracy at a turbulent time in that country's



history. Many in the Church will recall Dr Kao's work and his visits to the UK."

There are those of us from Bamford & Norden URC who met Dr Kao at CWM Swanwick many years ago, where we learned the song he had written in prison "O Lord, You are the Light of the World"

The following Biography was sent to Barbara Redmond from the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan.

"A third generation Christian KO Chùn-Bêng (Rev. Dr. C. M. Kao) was born 6 June 1929 in Tainan, Taiwan, the twelfth of thirteen children. Following early education in both Japan and Taiwan, C. M. Kao felt called to the Christian ministry and entered Tainan Theological College and Seminary. After graduation in 1953 he served as Evangelist and Itinerant Preacher among indigenous communities/churches in Taiwan.

His passion for indigenous ministries continued and shortly after his ordination to the Christian ministry in 1957 Rev. Kao was appointed as teacher and Principal of Yushan Theological College and Seminary until 1970 when he was elected as the General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan - a position he held until his retirement in 1989.

# During his years in Yushan he married Ms LI Le-Tin 李麗珍 (Mrs. Ruth Kao) and they were blessed with three children - two daughters and one son.

Throughout his term as PCT General Secretary and following Dr. Kao travelled extensively both home and overseas. Highly respected and esteemed, he gained wide ecumenical experience and knowledge having served on committees and participated in numerous international meetings as delegate, preacher and Bible Study leader over the years.

During the critical period in Taiwan in the 1970s, when he was General Secretary, the PCT issued its prophetic statements (three) which Rev. Kao

signed based on his deep faith conviction. Later, in 1980 Rev. C. M. Kao was arrested and imprisoned and tried by a military court accused and subsequently charged, for his sympathy and alleged help in harbouring an escaping dissident and Human Rights Movement's leader. The original sentence was for seven years but in 1984 Dr. Kao was given early release, on parole for one year, and returned to his duties as General Secretary of PCT.

During the four years, three months and twenty-one days [4321] of his imprisonment C. M. Kao along with the PCT received much prayer and moral support from churches, organizations and individuals worldwide as well as being adopted as a prisoner of conscience by Amnesty International. Many church leaders visited him in prison and the international support and protest to the government undoubtedly played a significant part in his early release. Throughout this period his family and home were under twenty-four-hours police surveillance.

A man of prayer and vision, Rev. Kao saw the mission task of the church as twofold where evangelism and social justice/welfare ran parallel. This was reflected in his unrelenting sincere efforts to preach the good news among all peoples; at the same time his commitment to peace and justice issues never wavered. Throughout his life C. M. Kao served tirelessly and humbly for his church and country Taiwan, inspired and strengthened by his living faith and belief in Jesus Christ his Saviour.

A poet and Chinese calligrapher (and once an ardent table-tennis player), over the years Dr. Kao wrote and published poems, hymns, and sermons in Taiwanese, Japanese, Mandarin Chinese, and English languages – some of which he wrote from his prison cell. Although formally retired in 1989 C. M. Kao continued active and went on to pioneer the PCT ministry and university for senior citizens; and was in constant demand as a preacher and speaker for almost three more decades! Along with his wife Ruth he retreated to live in their native home town Tainan for quieter days of reflection and time with their family.

After a time of devotion reading the Bible and praying with his wife and family, C. M. Kao fell asleep and in the afternoon went home to the Lord peacefully on Thursday, 14 February 2019 in Tainan, Taiwan – it was the day of C M and Ruth's 61<sup>st</sup> wedding anniversary!

Rev. C. M. Kao has conveyed in an open letter (in Chinese) his sincere will and desire that his funeral should be very simple to give honour and glory to the Lord he loved and served - his family and PCT are respecting his request.

### Have you lost someone you loved?

I grieve for you, Jonathan my brother; you were very dear to me. Your love for me was wonderful, more wonderful than that of women. How the mighty have fallen! **2 Samuel 1:26** 

A lament is a passionate expression of grief, a heartfelt cry of sadness. Here David, who composed some of the most memorable and uplifting songs of praise, allows himself the opportunity to pour out his heart to God because of his deep sorrow.

Christians are sometimes confused about how to express grief. Some contemporary teaching has emphasized the power of praise, and of praising God in all circumstances, so they feel guilty about the pain inside them and do not know how to release it.

Whilst Paul does say we are not to grieve 'like the rest of mankind' (1Thessalonians 4:13), he means we should not grieve in the hysterical way that characterizes those who have no hope in God. He does not mean that we should not grieve at all, or that we should suppress our true feelings. That would be cruel, unnatural and unhealthy. Grief is best acknowledged and expressed, and in a way that is consistent with our belief in heaven.

David's own heart feels most keenly the loss of his dearest friend, Jonathan. Those who have known the loss of a 'soul mate' will understand the depth of his feeling and the pain in his heart. His lament enables him to get in touch with his grief, to express it, and so begin the slow process of healing and recovery.

If you are grieving yourself today, be encouraged to pour out your heart to God. You could pray aloud or write your prayer down. You may find a song that helps, or a piece of music. You might talk with a trusted friend. You may just want a good cry. Whatever you do, remember that it's OK to grieve.



### Midday Concerts: Season's End

The final concert of the 2018/19 season brought to us a group of 16 most talented students from Chetham's School of Music, together with Simon Passmore, one of the

accompanists on the staff at the School. Their programme was, as promised, of baroque music played mainly on period instruments. We have, as far as I know, never had a viola da gamba in the Chapel before, and our Yamaha provided a lovely harpsichord sound. Personally, I prefer my baroque music live because the players are a delight to watch as well as hear. Though the whole group were outstanding musicians, including a gorgeous-sounding soprano, possibly the most memorable performer was Alastair Niven, whose mastery of the recorder was fantastic to watch as well as hear.

The audience too did us proud – 78 in all - and many from our own Chapel community, as well as some new guests from outside. Those of us who organise and staff the concerts are always delighted when our concerts are as well supported as this, and of course our artistes' spirits are uplifted by substantial and appreciative audiences. The Chetham's students went back to School full of praise for the way in which they had been received!



This is the time to thank the wonderful ladies, led by Margaret Ogden and Pamela Harrington, who provide refreshments. Theirs is no easy task when they have no idea exactly how many to cater for at each concert. Your regular attendance obviously helps them and prevents our wasting food or

not having enough! The sale of lunches enables us each year to make a contribution to Gift Day. Most of the concert entrance money goes to pay our performers, whom we reward appropriately.



I can tell you that the programme for 2019/2020 is almost complete! We open on 8<sup>th</sup> October with an outstanding jazz pianist, Roger Browne. In November we welcome a fine soprano, Charlotte Hoather, already embarked on a very promising

career. In December we have a pianist, Greta Gasser, already well known in Manchester as a teacher and performer. January brings back the A4 Brass Quartet, a truly exceptional ensemble who we deeply appreciated when they were here two years ago. Since that

visit, their careers have developed, with international performances a-plenty. Chetham's students return in March with a quite different kind of music from baroque. We are awaiting confirmation only from our February guests. As soon as it is available, we will of course print and publish the full M BRASS QUARTER programme.



It is always a delight to welcome not only our own church members but many visitors from outside, who evidently enjoy not just the music and the lunches but the lovely atmosphere of the Chapel. We look forward very much to seeing many of you next season as we continue to bring to the Chapel music of a high standard and a wide variety.

Aimed at those who benefit from a relaxed attitude toward noise and movement in the theatre.


#### CHILLED PERFORMANCE

Take a more casual approach to noise and movement in the auditorium but the performance itself is unchanged. This performance is for everybody and babes in arms are welcome [not walking or requiring their own seat]. It is ideal for people who feel more at ease knowing they can go in and out of the auditorium during the show including people with dementia.

#### SEMI-INTEGRATED BRITISH SIGN LANGUAGE INTERPRETE PERFORMANCE
