

The angels announced, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news



Church Leaders in Ukraine Continue to Protest against Russia



The leaders of Churches in Ukraine have urged Christian leaders in the West to help to try and persuade Russia to comply with humanitarian standards of behaviour, and to stop indiscriminately attacking civilians and torturing prisoners and deportees.

The All-Ukrainian Council of Churches and Religious Organisations has said "the Russian Federation has significantly stepped-up acts of terror and genocide, using a wide arsenal of missile armaments." They go on: "Russian officials do not hide their criminal desire to destroy the vital infrastructure of Ukrainian cities on the eve of cold winter in order to destabilise the socio-political situation, to sow fear and panic..."

The Orthodox Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew I has told a Roman Catholic news agency that he has made "heated and fraternal appeal" to Russia's Patriarch Kirill to distance himself from Moscow's aggression and "unjustified bloodshed".

However, preaching recently in Nizhny Novgorod, Patriarch Kirill assured Russian troops that they would be protected by the Virgin Mary and St Seraphim of Sarov (1754-1833) in vanquishing "forces of evil" and those who had "taken up arms against Holy Russia."

The Primate of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk and the head of Ukraine's independent Orthodox Church, Metropolitan Epiphany (Dumenko) have also voiced their opposition to the Russian Orthodox Church's position.


Edinburgh 10k Run


Get Walking again During the Christmas Break

During the Covid lockdown many people rediscovered the joy of walking for pleasure, but how many of these have returned to their armchairs as we have returned to our previously 'normal' lives? If you are one these, or if you are looking for new walks, then the Festival of Winter Walks organised by The Ramblers could get you walking again. The festival has been running for over 30 years and is designed 'to provide an opportunity to get more people walking'. This year, it runs from Tuesday 20 December 2022 to Thursday 5 January 2023.

The Ramblers is a charitable organization that aims to protect the ability of people to enjoy 'a sense of freedom and the benefits that come from being outdoors on foot.' Its initial objective was to ensure access to the countryside for the general public. By law, The Ramblers in England and Wales needs to be consulted before there are any changes to walking paths. They have hundreds of volunteers looking after thousands of miles of walking paths.

Toddlers are individuals but not isolated so creating social relationships is central to toddler life while supporting the parent/carer and preventing social isolation.

Our group varies from 20-30 very active toddlers. We are allergy aware and offer a wide selection of refreshments while encouraging healthy eating. Toddlers have been meeting for

30+ years on Tuesday mornings. Today a colourful banner offers a warm welcome and we post on BCNURC website, magazine, Facebook, Rochdale on Line and community magazines. We are open throughout the year, closing only for Christmas, New Year and Holy Week. Each session is covered by volunteers from our church family who are DBS registered. We feel toddlers need to continue their much loved routines. We plan around set activities and free play. Thanks to one of our mums we have recently added singing to our morning activities.

Annually we donate to charity. This year we donated to the UNICEF campaign supporting children in Ukraine.

Families are introduced to church by using the sanctuary during Christmas and Easter Services and we encourage older siblings to attend Messy Church and Summer Holiday Club.

Overheard in the car park a few weeks ago: "Mummy this is the most exciting day of the week." "Why," asked Mummy. "Because it's Toddlers!"

What more do we need? Fills our hearts to know we are responding to a need in our community.

This year we thank Rochdale Township again for their generous donations towards our Toy and Craft cupboards.

Finally, thank you volunteers. Your love and dedication to Toddlers is amazing. Should anyone like to visit us on a Tuesday morning, please do. It may encourage you to volunteer your help on an occasional basis.

Which is correct, Xmas or Christmas?



Sally Churchus, ACE chair asks which is correct. . .

Well, the answer is both really. Surprisingly, the shortened version of 'Christmas', ie the word 'Xmas' began as an abbreviation for church records and charts. X is the Greek symbol 'chi', which is the first letter of the word 'Christ'. Therefore, X stands for Christ. or the early Christians, most of whom spoke and wrote Greek, the word 'Xmas' signified 'Christ's Mass'. The shortening of 'Christmas' to 'Xmas' has been a common practice since at least the 16th Century. The correct pronunciation for the word 'Xmas' is 'Christmas', the same as if the word was written out in full. Xmas is not ex-mas!

Some people are unhappy with the abbreviation, thinking that the letter X is a secular replacement and is crossing Christ out. However, this is not the case if it is used in the original context. Although there is increasing secularization of Christmas, knowing the above, the X in Xmas can still remind us of the real reason for celebrating Christmas.


like to miss their weekly treat of good food and much needed company.


