## **Pastoral Letter**

Someone recently asked me I how find being a minister within a Missional Partnership of twelve churches. I would give a simple response: "It is like herding cats."

Let me explain this before someone gets hot under the collar. It is very easy to view this statement as a negative statement. Over the last few weeks I have heard of stories where ministers, in years gone by, have road-railed a particular vision or strategy on a church. Elders and congregations got little say in this imposed mission strategy. And if any churches do attempt to assert their own voice, I can imagine a minister grumbling quietly, "shepherding this flock is like herding cats. They don't want to do as I say."

Or you can view the statement in a positive light. You might recognise that cats do have a life of their own and they want to go their own way. So you adopt a leadership style which affirms the free-spirited nature of the cat.

Hopefully this is my approach to ministry. I'm not going to force my idea of a vision or strategy on a church. But I will be asking, "what is your vision?" In what way is God calling your church; who is the Spirit talking to; and how can we make this vision a reality?

A number of years ago I started up a motorcycle youth ministry. At the beginning I was out of work and suffering from depression. At the end the ministry was a finalist in the Christian Youth Work Awards. I had heard God's voice and followed him on an incredible journey. I still hold firmly to the conviction that God calls us today.

So yes, as a minister, it is my job to herd cats. I'm not trying to force you down my path. I am asking you what path God wants you to travel down. It's scary but rather exciting!

# **The Two Minutes Silence**

Editor: Canon Paul Hardingham considers the value of a brief silence



In the month when we think about those who have given their lives in war, the Two Minutes Silence is a significant act of remembrance. The silence provides an opportunity to remember those who have suffered in war and how we can work for a peaceful world. However, we can also find ourselves thinking about lunch or whether we've switched off our phone?

Victor Frankl, a victim of Auschwitz, suggested that the most intolerable of all human conditions is not imprisonment or hunger, but *lack of meaning*. The two minutes of silence enables us to connect with Jesus' message, which offers true meaning to our lives and world. He spoke of giving ourselves in love for each other and the world, 'Love your enemies and pray for those that persecute you' (Matthew 5:44). He also demonstrated such love in sacrificing His own life, 'Greater love has no-one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends' (John 15:13). When observing the silence, let's use it to reflect on this sacrificial love, as we call to mind those who have laid down their lives.

In our busy lives, where so much clamours for our attention, silence gives us an opportunity to reflect on our priorities and rediscover true meaning in our lives. This is not just for Remembrance Sunday, as Jesus often withdrew to find silence to seek God (eg: Luke 5:16). Let's use silence in our lives as space to seek God's will and offer ourselves to Him, just as those who gave themselves in conflict through the years.

'They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.'

# **King Charles III**

'And wherever you may live in the United Kingdom, or in the realms and territories across the world, and whatever may be your background or beliefs, I shall endeavour to serve you with loyalty, respect and love, as I have throughout my life.'

These are King Charles III's words from his TV broadcast following the death of Queen Elizabeth. They reflect the Queen's own commitment to serve the nation for 70 years. They also express the continuity of monarchy: *'The Queen is dead. Long live the King!'* 

However, continuity doesn't mean that things remain the same. King Charles III will face different challenges to the Queen, but the same God works His purposes through each of them. At his death, King David spoke these words to his son Solomon: '*Be strong and observe what the Lord your God requires: walk in obedience to him... Do this so that you may prosper in all you do and wherever you go.*' (1 Kings 2:2,3). These are words for our new King and ourselves, as we seek God's will in a time of uncertainty.

King Charles III has demonstrated his ability to get alongside people to 'see the value of each person as God sees them.' (Archbishop of Canterbury). He is also in touch with the important issues of the day. He has provided young people with opportunities to change their lives. He understands the life of the poorest in our society, and he is passionate about the state of our planet. Let's pray for our king, as he faces new challenges and opportunities:

'I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness.' (1 Timothy 2:1,2).

# Church in the World Group Project 2023



The launch date for the 2023 project is 19 February when we will be visited again by Su McClelland. The project will end on Easter Sunday, 9 April. We will be supporting Embrace the Middle East's work in Egypt.

One example of their work is "Think and Do" which supports work to improve the social and economic position of women in rural Upper Egyptian villages. Life Schools enable women who missed out on an education to learn to read, write, count and master a skill such as sewing or hairdressing. Microloans and vocational training enable widows to provide for their children.

One of the participants in the "Think and Do" project said "I learnt how to read and write and this helped a lot to write my name instead of using a stamp to sign official documents. I learnt also how to protect my

children from home accidents and how to cook healthy food for them."



# **Garden Update**

In November we will be planting 200 whips (twigs basically) of Hawthorn, to make a new hedge in the rear garden bordering Jowkin Lane. Although it will take several years to grow, it is our contribution to the eco system required for our world. The cost of this project has been funded through a grant from Rochdale Council which we are very grateful for. We are also planning to plant 5 Rowan trees, which will help to replace the 20 Ash trees we had to lose due to Ash dieback.

In April I wrote an article asking if people would like to purchase a tree in memory of a loved one. The trees could not be planted until Autumn. Several people contacted me for further information, and I subsequently looked into purchasing the trees. Unfortunately, the cost of the trees has risen considerably in the last 6 months (along with everything else).

This year too is the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the URC and in summer it was suggested by URC Synod that 50 trees be planted by churches in the North West Synod area. As we had already agreed to plant 5 Rowan trees, it was suggested that this would be



our contribution to the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebrations.

Although people have already offered to donate to the cost of the trees, we are still short of the total amount required. If you feel you could help by donating to the costs involved in purchasing and planting the trees, or would like further information regarding what is involved, please do not hesitate to contact me.



# Help your Hedgehogs this Autumn



With our warmer British autumns, hedgehogs now tend to begin hibernation later – in December or January. In the meantime, it is critical that they build up enough body weight to get them through those lean, bleak weeks of January to April... so now is the time to help them, by feeding them.

The hedgehog is carnivorous and, in the wild, lives on a diet of beetles, earthworms and other invertebrates. But in the winter, the bugs are dead or buried, and the worms deep underground. So – a hedgehog would appreciate your help! But don't put out milk and bread – both are actually bad for hedgehogs. Instead, they will thrive on tins of dogfood or non-fishy cat-food and water.

And while your spiney guests are noisily munching their dinner, you can prepare a bedroom, should they decide to move in. A nice deep compost heap will keep a hedgehog warm. It is also possible to buy hedgehog hibernation nests – ask our local wildlife centre or the RSPCA for details.

# **Eco Recipe of the Month**



#### Blackberry and hazeInut friends

Moist, nutty little cakes. Makes 8-12



butter 180g plain flour 50g icing sugar 180g ground hazelnuts 100g lemon zest 1 tsp egg whites 5 blackberries 60g



Set the oven at 200C/gas mark 5. Lightly butter 12 shallow bun tins.

Put the butter in a small pan and melt over a moderate heat then watch it carefully until it becomes a dark, nutty gold. Take great care not to let it burn. Leave it to cool a little.

Sieve the flour and sugar into a large mixing bowl then add most of the ground nuts. Grate in the lemon zest.

Beat the egg whites to a soft, rather moist, sloppy foam – they shouldn't be able to stand up.

Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients then pour in the egg whites together with the melted butter. Mix lightly but thoroughly, then pour into the buttered tins. Roughly chop the blackberries and drop into the tins. Scatter the remaining hazelnuts over the top.

Bake for 10-15 minutes, remove from the oven, then leave to settle before carefully removing from the tins with a palette knife.




