Message from the (Bamford) Manse

I love the image in this passage of scripture that talks about life as a race. On my early morning dog walks in the last few days I have been listening to podcasts recorded by the American Pastor Rick Warren. One of the series of three I was listening to recently spoke about life as a race

and he used this passage of scripture. A race we are all invited to run.

He spoke about God being like a parent at the school sport's day. He asked at what point in the race does a parent start shouting encouragement to their small child – the answer of course being as soon as they begin, to the moment they finish the race. Reflecting on the death of Queen Elizabeth II

She was among us as one who serves

The news of the Queen's death has reverberated round the world; the deep sadness felt in the United Kingdom is shared across the globe, not least in the Commonwealth of Nations which meant so much to her. There was something rocklike in her character which impressed everyone. In times of danger, uncertainty and personal grief, she consistently exemplified courage and confidence. We are reminded of Christ's signal to his disciples: "You will hear of wars and rumours of wars; see that you are not alarmed".

Queen Elizabeth made no secret of her source of inspiration and guidance. "For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace", she said, ... "is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role model of reconciliation and forgiveness, He stretched out His hands in love, acceptance and healing." It was Christ's revolutionary example of leadership which shaped her own sovereignty. He had confounded the prevailing perceptions of authority with a dramatic demonstration. At the Last Supper He noted that none of His disciples was willing to perform the customary task of a servant by washing the dirt off the feet of the others. So *He* did it. Then He gave them this revolutionary definition of leadership:

"The kings of the gentiles lord it over them, and those in authority over them are called benefactors. But not so with you; rather, the greatest among you must become like the youngest and the leader like one who serves. For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one at the table? But I am among you as one who serves."

On her 21st birthday in 1947, Princess Elizabeth was touring South Africa with her parents. She made this personal, Christian commitment then and she lived by it throughout her reign: *"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service".*

Right until the end, when she invited the new British Prime Minister to form a Government she was doing her duty. She broke into her Summer holiday at Balmoral to give an audience, first with Boris Johnson as the outgoing Prime Minister, and then with Liz Truss, the 15th Prime Minister of her reign. We will treasure the photograph published then, which showed her at the age of 96 looking frail, but beaming warmth and kindness. And in the midst of national and international mourning, we may also allow ourselves to recall the glorious episode with Paddington Bear during Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations when, solemnly and self-deprecatingly, she drew a marmalade sandwich from her handbag. It gave us a glimpse into the character of a Queen who carried the weight of her office solemnly, but did not take herself too seriously.

The Church of England's historic prayer for the Sovereign concludes with the petition that **"finally after this life she may attain everlasting joy and felicity".** We hope you will join with us now in saying, 'Amen'.

Church in the World Group: Updates

I am writing on behalf of the group to update on what we have been up to, so here goes:

 Developing World Project: it has felt very strange not to be launching the traditional chapel project in September 22. As agreed with the Elder's and Church Meeting the 2022 will be deferred to the period of Lent in 2023. The Project will be launched on the 19th February 2023.

We will be working with Embrace the Middle East (formerly Bible Lands Society) to support one of their partner organisations in the Middle East. Su McClellan led worship earlier this year to introduce us to the work of Embrace. Our project will involve supporting women's empowerment programmes in Egypt. The literacy and numeracy programmes help women from rural communities learn to read and write and manage their household budgets. There is a programme to help women set up income generating projects and also one related to learning about FGM (Female Genital Mutilation which we learnt about in the Tanzania project) which is a problem in Egypt.

RADAR (Rochdale Action with Destitute Asylum Seekers and Refugees)



is a registered charity set up by a few members from Rochdale churches to support, as it says, destitute asylum seekers and refugees. They come to this country to seek protection; they are fleeing the effects

of war and persecution sometimes because of their political views, religious views or ethnicity in their own countries. They must be desperate to try to cross the channel in small boats.

When they arrive, they are classed as asylum seekers and after registration they are sent to various areas of the country while their claims are being investigated and they stay in accommodation provided by an agency appointed by the Home Office. They get a small amount of money per week for food, clothes, travel etc. If the Home Office accept that they have a genuine case, they are given **Leave to Remain**. Now they are refugees. The responsibility for housing then moves to the Local Authority and they have to leave their Home Office accommodation. It can take a couple of months before they get housing and benefits and so can become destitute – as with Ayman and Kibrom who lived with us.


In many cases their asylum applications are refused, often because they do not have the correct evidence. When you flee from your country, you do not always bring the correct documentation. They can make a fresh claim if they can gather fresh evidence. In the meantime, they have to leave their accommodation and have **no recourse to public funds** and they also may become destitute. These are the 2 categories of people we are trying to help.

The Catholic Diocese has agreed that the vacant presbytery at St John the Baptist's RC Church in Rochdale can be used to house 3 destitute asylum seekers and refugees. With the aid of grants of £50,000, the renovation work is about to begin. RADAR will be responsible for the running costs (utilities, council tax and insurance) and they will be giving each of the guests a small weekly living allowance.

If you are interested in supporting this work you can become a member of RADAR (it is free to join) by getting an application form from me.

Big Breakfast

The Approach of Winter



As we start to approach winter, we face the uncertainty of energy prices and cost of living crisis. Here are a few tips to help as we get ready for winter.



Start testing your boiler to make sure that it works again after summer. Start thinking about getting the annual gas safety check booked in for the boiler.

Have a look at what you have previously set your heating timer and thermostat. Set the timer for only the times you are likely to need it, the boiler doesn't need to be on if you are out during the day. A healthy temperature within the home varies from 18 to 21 degrees depending on individual circumstances such as health conditions. Turn radiators down that don't need to be on full blast.




Start to seal up those unwanted draughts around the house. You can get draught strips for around windows and doors, and radiator foils to go behind radiators on external walls to reflect the lost heat into rooms. Seal up unused chimneys, and unused key holes in doors. As the nights draw in close curtains earlier, keep internal doors shut to keep the heat in the rooms it is needed.

Regarding the energy crisis we are yet to find out how the government's cap on prices at £2500 a year will look. Your energy supplier will update you on what they will charge you when they know more. Starting from October every house in the UK will start to get the £400 government payment. This will be in 2 instalments of £67 followed by 4 lots of £66 starting in October and every month until March. If you pay by direct debit it will be deducted from what your monthly payment should be. For example if your payment should be £166 then your direct debit coming out of your account will be £100/£99. If you pay a monthly or quarterly bill the payments will be credited to your account. If you are on prepayment meters the money may go automatically on your smart meter or sent out to you as a voucher. Equally the warm homes discount payments of £150 will be automatic this year, so if you claim the eligible benefits you don't have to apply separately you will just receive this.

There is support available in your local areas including: food banks, coffee mornings, mental health cafes and organisations, household funds, and charities offering energy advice. If you are struggling this winter please talk to someone, whether a family member, friend or your Elder and get the support you need. We all have to rally round this winter and offer our homes, hearts and help to those who will be cold and hungry.

I pray there will be an end to the cost of living crisis soon but until then, I pray for strength and hope for every individual this winter.

Chapel Men who Died in Service during the First World War

In 2016 the Greaves Family ventured to Belgium and France on a War Graves Tour with a friend, David Galloway and his family who is a local historian and has done much research and produced two books about the war dead of Prestwich and Whitefield. The trip was a moving adventure we will never forget, the enormity of the losses really came to life and I would recommend such a trip to anyone.

On David's advice, to make the trip more interesting, I took the names of the men killed in service from Bamford Chapel, and we visited a grave of one of

the men and viewed another's name on one of the memorials. I never got around to progressing the rest of the research. However now David has prompted me to return to this and on our behalf has started research on each of the men who did not return from active service. Through looking at records he will attempt to bring the characters of these men alive as part of the history of our church.

He has already been able to gather significant information but wonders if

anyone in the congregation can provide any information or contact points for any of the families of the men named below who are named in church records.

Prayer Request for Flood Victims in Pakistan

Pakistan is facing devastating floods because of erratic monsoon rains, environmental degradation and global warming. These are the worst floods since 2010. Therefore, we request your prayers for the people of Pakistan, and all relief agencies.

Pakistan has been witnessing floods since last July, caused by the heavy and regular monsoon rains that fall every year. But the amount of rain this year is unprecedented. Southern Sindh province alone received 464% more rainfall this year. The situation worsened in mid -August. The floods have



created an emergency situation and epic humanitarian crisis in the country.

Most of the people can't find safe places to live as water is everywhere, and more spells of floods are coming in different parts of the country. Many towns don't have a food supply as roads and bridges have been destroyed, and the crops have been washed away. People are struggling to get food, clean water, clothes, medicine and shelter.

Smile please! It's Friday 7 October!

Friday is often said to the happiest day of the week. Traditionally it was pay day, the end of the working week. If this is true, then Friday 7 October could be the happiest day of the year because it is World Smile Day 2022, the day when we are all asked to do a small act of kindness that will put a smile on someone else's face!

And faced this autumn and winter with the worrying threat of the biggest ever cost of living crisis driven by the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the ever increasing threat of violent gun and knife crime, the continuing threat of pandemics, and the increasingly serious climate changes that are having a devastating impact on millions of lives throughout the world, there is a greater need than ever to share some happiness.

The organisers quite rightly point out that what we can all focus on the small things we can control, like taking a little extra time to help someone with something, or to make them laugh. The idea is that if we all try to do one small act of kindness this World Smile Day, then, together, we can make a huge change in the world.

Why not start by wearing a smiley face emoji that was designed in 1963 by an artist called Harvey Ball. He created the smiley face design for a local company that wanted to boost the morale of their employees. Over time, the design grew and grew in popularity until it became the international symbol of cheer and good will that it is today. Harvey never copyrighted or



trademarked the design, so, despite the symbol's enormous popularity, the only money he ever made from the smiley face was the \$45 he was initially paid for it. Harvey, however, maintained a philosophical attitude about this, and was happy to see his design becoming used so much.

In the late 1990s, Harvey decided that we should all set aside one day to simply smile and be kind towards each other, which is how World Smile Day came about. On this day, we can forget all our differences and just focus on being cheerful towards everyone we meet.

When he died in 2001, the Harvey Ball World Smile Foundation was set up to honour his name and memory by raising money for small, grassroots charities that would otherwise receive little attention or funding. There's a lot of truth in that well known song recorded by jazz pianist Seger Ellis in 1928, Louis Armstrong in 1929 and numerous famous singers ever since:

When you're smiling, the whole world smiles with you!



And further smiles!

A few weeks ago David Watson mentioned the value of a Smile in his worship. Here is a beautiful poem to illustrate this.

THERE'S SUNSHINE IN A SMILE

During those years, I believe I missed a lot of joy, trying to give it birth outside of God's timing."

So why not learn to enjoy where you are, while you're waiting to get to where you want to be? After all, all your life you will spend more time waiting than you will receiving. And when you receive what you're waiting for now – you'll begin waiting for something else. That's life! In other words, if we don't learn to 'wait well', we'll live with endless frustration.

Waiting well will also help us prepare for our dream. The Bible puts it this way: *"in due season we shall reap, if we faint not" (Gal. 6:9).* "Due season" is when God knows we're ready, not when we think we are. He has set appointments to accomplish certain things in our life, so we might as well settle down and wait patiently, because that's when it will happen – and not before.



Isn't it comforting to know that God knows what you need, He knows when you need it and He knows how best to get it to you. All He asks you to do is trust Him.







Winter challenge for Ukrainians

Eight months since Russia's invasion, Christian Aid is warning that millions of Ukrainians face a bleak winter in temporary shelters and damaged homes.

Christian Aid is working hard to help Ukrainians get through the cold months, when temperatures can plunge to -20C.

Alongside its local partners and other charities, the programme for winter includes insulating shelters, restoring toilet and shower blocks, and handing out cash, food, blankets, toiletries and other essentials to support 57,000 people.



Christian Aid CEO Patrick Watt said:

"Thanks to the unprecedented generosity of the British people, Christian Aid is helping local people to take the lead in tackling their own priorities. But with disrupted power, freezing temperatures lie ahead for conflict-hit Ukrainians already struggling with trauma and a lack of medical treatment. We must do more, and quickly.

"One helpful measure would be for the Ukrainian government to lift the tax on humanitarian aid. We urge the UK government to use its relationships in Kyiv to achieve this. We want to complement state activities – not replace them."
