The Language of Love

The writer Gary Chapman describes the 5 'love languages' as words of encouragement, quality time, gifts, acts of service and touch. Do you have a preferred 'language of love'?



With the approach of St Valentines' Day, let's ask: what is God's love language? 'Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth.' (1 John 3:18). God's love is expressed in the word agape, which is exclusively found in the New Testament. Greek has a number of words for love e.g. empathetic, friendship or sexual, but agape is defined uniquely by Jesus. 'This is how we


know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down His life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters.' (1 John 3:16). It provides the model for how we should love others.

Agape love is self-giving: it is ready to put the other person first, just as Jesus gave His life for us on the cross by dying in our place. Are we generous with our time, words, money and service to others?

Agape love takes the initiative: are we ready to show love to those who don't deserve it? Do we have eyes of compassion to see the needs around us and a heart to reach out to them?

Agape love is intentional: are we ready to get close to those in need around us, irrespective of what time we have or how we feel?

The story is told of Jesus asking a little child, 'how much do you love me?' The child replied 'lots and lots and lots!' They then asked Jesus how much He loved them. Jesus stretched out His arms wide and said 'l love you this much', as they nailed Him to a cross.





Hosting a Refugee

Through RADAR (Rochdale Action for Destitute Asylum Seekers and Refugees) we heard about an organisation called Refugees at Home, who organise temporary placements for refugees and asylum seekers who would otherwise be homeless. As we have a spare room we decided to apply. We completed a detailed application form and had to get 2 references. Following a visit from a representative from Refugees at Home to verify us and our house, we were accepted and in early December we were asked to house a young man from South Sudan.

Ayman is 22 years old and left South Sudan a couple of years ago. He spent time in Libya where he was treated as a slave. He eventually got a boat and sailed to Italy. Two of his friends were drowned on the journey. He spent time in



Italy, France and Belgium, where he suffered racist abuse and mostly lived on the streets.

He has been in the UK for 9 months now and has leave to remain, which means he is now classed as a refugee rather than an asylum seeker. After a 6 week wait he now gets universal credit and help from the job centre to find a job.

He was a lovely young man and keen to help. Twice he thoroughly cleaned downstairs and often insisted on washing up for us, which was great when I was in the middle of preparations for Christmas. He even cooked us 2 Sudanese meals.

We had told the organisation that we could not accommodate him after 23 December as family were coming for Christmas. We were quite worried about what would happen to him but our prayers were answered. Three days before he was due to leave he got a phone call to say accommodation in Bury was available for him on 23 December. He has a small flat, sharing with another young man, with a bathroom, kitchen, living room and his own bedroom with basic furniture and equipment.

Having Ayman staying with us was an interesting and rewarding experience. If you would like to know more about Refugees at Home we would be happy to talk about it. *The Redmonds*

They will play on period instruments, and their programme should make a big contrast with the other artistes we have heard since October, or even at any time! Do support us and them. 
Church Membership

Stuffed Cabbage Rolls with Tomato Sauce

Ingredients. (can easily be adapted)

50g butter or olive spread 4 large red onions, finely sliced 2 tsp light brown sugar 3 garlic cloves, finely chopped 10 fresh thyme sprigs or 1 tsp dried 8 large cabbage leaves (savoy recommended) or can use spring greens 250g cooked basmati rice 400g tin green lentils, drained and rinsed 100ml vegetable stock, hot Small bunch of fresh basil or again use dried



For the Tomato sauce

Olive/veg oil 1 large onion 2 crushed garlic cloves 2 x 400g tins chopped tomatoes 100ml red wine, don't skimp on the quality as you will need to drink the rest whilst preparing and eating the meal 1 tbsp caster sugar 2 tbsp dried oregano

To make the sauce

Heat the oil in a deep frying pan, fry onion for 10 minutes, add garlic cook for 1 minute, add tomatoes, wine, sugar and oregano, cover and simmer over medium heat for 30-35 minutes, season with salt and pepper to taste.

For the filling

Heat 30g butter in a large deep frying pan, fry onion with sugar for 15 minutes until begins to brown, add garlic and thyme for 2 minutes then spoon onto a plate.

While frying the above, prepare the cabbage, put in a steamer or colander, cover and cook for 4-5 minutes, remove and let cool slightly then cut out thick stem in a V shape.

Heat the remaining butter in the same pan used to cook the red onions, stir in rice and lentils until well coated, pour in veg stock and bubble for

2-3 minutes until well reduced, season with salt and pepper, stir in the basil followed by reserved onions mix.

Assembly

Lay a cabbage leaf flat on a board, put an eighth of the filling along the centre spine leaving 3cm free at each end. Fold in the ends over the filling, fold over one side to cover the filling and the folded ends, roll the now covered part of the filling onto the other side of the cabbage leaf to complete the parcel.

Laugh at your efforts, take a swig of wine and do the others.

Heat the oven to 18oC/16oC for fan/gas 4. Put the stuffed leaves in a large serving dish with the seam down, pour over the sauce, cover and cook for 10 minutes, uncover, scatter with basil and serve with the following which you will have made first.

Beetroot and Feta Soda Bread

3 small beetroot (about 250g) peeled and coarsely grated
500g plain white flour, little extra for dusting
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
1 tsp fine sea salt
360ml of buttermilk
200g feta, crumbled
Fresh rosemary sprigs to decorate

Heat the oven to 200C/180 fan/gas 6, put beetroot into a clean piece of muslin or j-cloth and squeeze out as much liquid as possible Put the flour, bicarb and salt in a large mixing bowl and stir to combine, pour in buttermilk using a wooden spoon. When it has almost come together as a dough tip it out onto a clean surface and knead in the grated beetroot and crumbled feta, once combined shape the dough into a ball and flatten slightly.

Dust a baking sheet with flour, transfer the loaf to the baking sheet, then stud the outside with rosemary sprigs, bake for 30 minutes until golden and cooked through, allow to cool before slicing.

Congratulate yourself with another glass of wine, then serve the above.

You may need to open another bottle of wine for your guests.



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
